

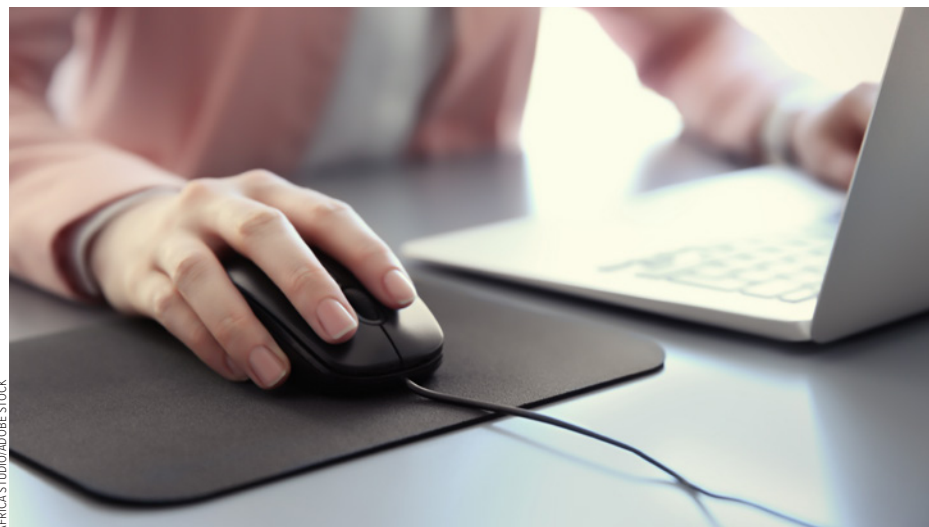

Earn an A+ for school bus stop safety

We've all seen a scary video or two of someone ignoring a stopped bus and driving around it. More than 385,000 Kentucky kids travel to and from school on a bus every day. Be sure the kids you know follow the rules for bus stop safety.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, school buses are the safest mode of transporting children to school. The greatest safety risk is what happens at the stop before and after a bus arrives.

Review these bus stop safety tips before the first day of school:

- Arrive at the stop a few minutes before your scheduled pick-up time. Never run after the bus once it has left the stop.
- Wear bright, contrasting colors to be more easily seen by drivers. Consider adding a piece of high-visibility, reflective tape to coats and backpacks.
- Stand 6 feet (three giant steps) away from the curb.
- Watch for dangerous traffic conditions. Look both ways before stepping off the curb to get on the bus, even if the bus has its stop sign out.
- Wait for the bus and traffic to stop before stepping onto the road. Cross the street at least 12 feet in front of a stopped bus.
- Stay away from the bus wheels at all times—the driver can't see you. Don't pick up anything dropped near the bus without first telling the driver and getting permission.
- Don't wear earbuds or earphones. Put away phones or games. You may be able to hear oncoming traffic before you see it.
