### Teaching safety to our members and

communities

ublic safety is a commitment that South Kentucky RECC takes seriously. The co-op has approximately 7,000 miles of electric lines in 11 Kentucky and two Tennessee counties. South Kentucky RECC makes it a priority to educate its members and communities about safety issues concerning power lines, underground transformers, substations and other things related to its energy.

South Kentucky RECC's electric safety trailer provides a powerful demonstration of high voltage electric, designed to make people aware of the severity of electrical hazards and how to safely deal with power lines.

South Kentucky RECC Safety and Loss Control Manager Eric Chumbley says with the trailer, children and adults can witness the flash of an electrical arc, hotter than the surface of the sun, learn about electrical faults and other dangerous situations, and how to avoid them.

"Our safety trailer is 16 feet long and is an exact replica of the equipment we use on everyday line construction. We use a generator for our power source, and backfeed the transformer mounted on the trailer, to energize the line to 7,200 volts, which is our main focus explaining how dangerous backfeeds can be and how we avoid them. demonstrates and educates the public on proper safety precautions around electrical equipment.

"The trailer and accompanying safety program are available to first responders, local schools, scout groups, 4-H and and civic groups and businesses," Chumbley says. "We offer this service to anyone in the public interested in seeing the demo in an effort to save lives."

Chumbley adds that the safety demonstration covers:

- Typical causes of outages.
- · Backfeeding of electricity.
- Automobile accidents involving South Kentucky RECC poles and equipment.

- Fuse and breaker operations.
- Right-of-way/line loss due to vegetation.

He stresses that participants are also shown how South Kentucky RECC employees work safely around electricity—using the proper personal protective equipment, such as rubber gloves and sleeves, protective eyewear, harnesses, etc.

Safety is priority one with South Kentucky RECC. The co-op's safety trailer demonstration, available to groups in our communities, is one way that we try to keep everyone safe. **DSK** 

### **Protect your eyes**



ccording to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 2,000 U.S. workers each day sustain a job-related eye injury requiring medical treatment. March is Workplace Eye Wellness Month, and South Kentucky RECC wants to remind everyone that eye safety is not limited to their workplace.

According to the American Academy of Ophthalmology, many eye injuries occur at home. Chemicals, like bleach, cause about 125,000 eye injuries each year; using power tools can send wood chips or other things flying into the air; and yard tools, such as mowers, trimmers, etc., can throw dirt and debris into the air.

By simply wearing protective eye wear, the risk for injury to your eyes is reduced by as much as 90%. The American Academy of Ophthalmology recommends that every household have at least one pair of American National Standards Institute-approved protective eyewear. It could save your sight.

## Build a Touchstone Energy Home and save

pring is when many begin the process of building a new home. Be sure to check out our Touchstone Energy Home program. By building your home to Touchstone Energy Home energy efficiency standards, you pocket the savings.

Touchstone Energy Homes are tested and inspected for all areas of heat loss before being certified. This ensures your home is energy efficient. A new home must pass a pre-drywall and final inspection before it qualifies. This final inspection includes a blower door test that measures the total air flow rate through all openings in the house.

Before you begin building, stop by South Kentucky RECC's offices to pick



up a copy of the *Touchstone Energy Home Specifications* booklet to make sure your new home will qualify.

# **ENERGY STAR rating brings manufactured home savings**

onsidering a mobile home purchase? When you purchase a manufactured home, choose an upgrade to ENERGY STAR, provide your certification and receive an \$1,150 incentive.

Since the ENERGY STAR-certified home uses substantially less energy for heating, cooling and water heating than a standard manufactured home, it's less expensive to run. You may save an average of more than 4,000 kilowatt-hours per year when compared to the standard manufactured home. Right now, that's an average savings of about \$450 each year or about \$40 a month.

"Members who are buying new manufactured housing should request an ENERGY STAR upgrade as part of their order," says Alan Coffey, energy services/ member engagement manager for South Kentucky RECC. "Our incentive will cover the cost of the upgrade in most cases, and then you'll save month after month, year after year, in lower electric bills."

To be eligible for this incentive, new manufactured homes must meet the following criteria:

- United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Systems Building Research Alliance (SBRA) guidelines as an ENERGY STAR Manufactured Home.
- Primary source of heat must be a heat pump and meet federal minimum efficiency guidelines.
- Home must be all electric.
- Home must be installed by the manufacturer on lines served by the co-op. Coffey adds if your manufactured home is not ENERGY STAR-certified, but it has a heat pump, South Kentucky RECC has a \$500 incentive that is available.

Call South Kentucky RECC to speak to an energy advisor to see if you qualify for an incentive.
