South Kentucky RECC recognized for service

n recognition of outstanding service to members, South Kentucky RECC has been named a Community Cornerstone Cooperative by Kentucky Electric Cooperatives. The statewide association spotlighted the co-op's performance throughout the pandemic to keep members informed and connected.

Earlier this year, the statewide association developed the Community
Cornerstone Cooperative designation to applaud individual cooperatives, their employees and boards for continued efforts that advance and sustain the "Reliable, Resilient, Responsive" core values of Kentucky's electric cooperatives.

"South Kentucky RECC has a tradition of service to its members that is worthy of special recognition," says Chris Perry, president and CEO of Kentucky Electric Cooperatives. "With innovative programming to promote safety, protect members from scams and to help families make ends meet during the pandemic, South Kentucky RECC has done an incredible job responding to unique challenges and member concerns."

In addition to ongoing member services and civic activities, South Kentucky RECC adjusted to the COVID-19 pandemic to help members. The co-op made special efforts to assist members having difficulties with their bill, encouraging all members to contact them for options and assistance. The



cooperative even developed COVID-19 protocols to allow its community rooms to be used as voting centers.

"As a cooperative, the reason we exist is for the benefit of our members," says Ken Simmons, South Kentucky RECC president and CEO. "We listen to their concerns and encourage them to reach out with any questions."

"We appreciate the trust that our fellow co-op members place in us when they elect us to the board," says Cathy Epperson, South Kentucky RECC board chair. "We are accountable to the membership and are so proud of the co-op's staff for never forgetting that commitment, especially during challenging times."

Kentucky Electric Cooperatives adopted the "Reliable, Resilient, Responsive" theme in 2019, emphasizing core values that have served cooperatives and their communities for generations. The association highlighted specific actions by South Kentucky RECC consistent with the campaign:

Reliable

As members faced uncertainty due to the COVID-19 pandemic, South Kentucky RECC is a constant source of trustworthy information, launching a new website with easy-to-find guidance, and sharing key information on account access, scam warnings and other issues. SKRECC employed social media channels to stay in near-constant contact with members and worked daily to be their trusted energy adviser.

Resilient

South Kentucky RECC adapted to the restrictions of the pandemic to ensure that members could stay engaged. With the traditional annual meeting sidelined by health restrictions, the co-op launched drive-thru Member Appreciation Days with buckets, LED lights, and door prizes. To strengthen lines of communication, South Kentucky RECC launched a campaign to encourage members to update their contact information.

Responsive

In response to a series of harsh winter storms, South Kentucky RECC crews braved difficult conditions to restore electricity in both their own territory and to help other co-ops. The co-op is responsive to members who have questions about their energy use, providing energy efficiency support and Cooperative Solar options.

SKRECC updates member portal

outh Kentucky RECC is excited to announce the launch of its newly updated member portal at www.skrecc.com. The streamlined member portal can be found at the My Account tab on the co-op website's home page.


The member portal connects SKRECC members to their accounts with ease and convenience, says Michelle Herrman, vice president of finance and member services.

"Our updated member portal centralizes each South Kentucky RECC member's account information for an extremely efficient, uncomplicated digital experience. Through the portal, SKRECC members can access any number of services, available at their fingertips, as well as monitor their electric usage. This can be a great aid in helping members

understand their usage—when they are using electricity and how it relates to the temperatures. It puts control in the members' hands as they can monitor usage in an effort to decrease the amount of electricity used."

South Kentucky RECC members will have access to the following on the updated member portal:

- Pay a bill
- Update account information—billing/ physical address, phone numbers and email addresses
- View account history—billing history and payment history
- · View Capital Credit margins
- Manage or sign up for notifications/ alerts-payment alerts, balance/usage alerts, outage alerts and account profile notifications

- Enroll in bill payment options—auto payments, levelized billing and draft payments
- Review up to two years of usage history
- · Apply for service
- · Disconnect service
- Request/report a variety of other services—report a broken or damaged meter, change a service entrance, change a temporary service to a permanent one, disconnect at the weatherhead, request an energy audit, install a lightning arrestor, locate underground service, move an electric pole, report a broken security light, report a hazard, request underground service, request the removal of an electric line or security light and report right-of-way issues.
- Sign up for the People Fund program
- · Sign up for e-bills

To sign up for the member portal, visit My Account at skrecc.com; click sign in; then create an account.

In addition, South Kentucky RECC's website also has a new quick pay feature that does not require logging into the member portal. Members just need their account number found on their statement and the last four digits of the telephone number associated with that account.



Stay safe around substations

ubstations are a very important part of the South Kentucky RECC electrical system. They contain equipment to regulate the voltage of electricity so it can be safely delivered to your home or business. As important as they are, they also pose a real danger to those who are not trained or authorized to enter them.

The 40 substations that provide electricity to the South Kentucky RECC distribution system and its members are owned by East

Kentucky Power Cooperative (EKPC). These substations consist of power lines, transformers, circuit breakers and other equipment that carry extremely high voltages of electricity—anywhere from 69,000 volts to 161,000 volts. To put that into perspective, the South Kentucky RECC lines that carry electricity throughout the service territory to our members' homes typically carry from 7,200 volts to 14,400 volts.

It is illegal to enter substations, and typically, they are surrounded by chain-link fencing and barbed wire, and are marked with signs that clearly warn of danger.

It is also important to teach children the dangers of substations. Children should be warned never to enter an electric substation for any reason—even on a dare or to attempt to retrieve a pet, ball or any toy from these areas. Call South Kentucky RECC for assistance.

Finally, SKRECC asks for your help to keep our members and substations safe. If you notice anything unusual with electric facilities, such as an open substation gate, open equipment, hanging wire, etc., contact 911 or your local co-op office immediately.

If you see anyone loitering around electric substations or electric facilities, other than South Kentucky RECC or EKPC personnel or contractors who are servicing the area in marked vehicles, call 911. NEVER attempt to confront or apprehend the person yourself.

Substations are necessary parts of the electrical power system, but unless you're a professional technician trained to build, operate or service them and authorized to enter them, they are extremely dangerous. South Kentucky RECC urges everyone to be cautious and safe around substations.

If you see anyone loitering around electric substations or electric facilities, other than South Kentucky RECC or EKPC personnel or contractors who are servicing the area in marked vehicles, call 911. NEVER attempt to confront or apprehend the person yourself.
